Thomas Leslie, FAIA is professor of architecture at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign. His research into the historical relationship between engineering, design, and construction has produced books on Chicago Skyscrapers, the Italian engineer Pier Luigi Nervi, and Philadelphia architect Louis Kahn.

Leslie is a founding member of the Construction History Society of America. He has appeared as an expert on building technology and history for outlets such as the BBC World Service, the New York Times, and the Discovery Channel program Impossible Engineering. Leslie has co-curated the current Skyscraper Museum exhibition, The Modern Concrete Skyscraper, and he maintains an active on-line research notebook, Architecture Farm, that is regularly cited for its explanations of building science in the news.


Will Quam
